## FROM THE REGIONS: AFRICA-IALE

The Africa-IALE initiative has come a long way since its conception at the 2002 US-IALE conference in Lincoln, Nebraska. Milestones of the last 18 months are:

- inauguration with a symposium on “Landscapes of Africa” during the recent IALE world congress in Darwin
- increased membership (42)
- proposal for a regional congress in Ghana in 2005.

The Africa-IALE initiative started with a meeting between Dr. Rob Jongman (Treasurer, IALE-International) and four participants (Hussein Alidina, Crispen Marunda, Rob Plowes and Henry Bulley) at the US-IALE conference in Lincoln, Nebraska, in May 2002. At this meeting we discussed our intentions to form the Africa regional chapter of IALE. A year later we had a successful launch of Africa-IALE with a symposium on “Landscapes of Africa” at the Darwin conference. Despite travel limitations, the symposium attracted five presentations and participants from Africa and across the world. The momentum gathered from the Darwin conference has culminated in expansion of the initial “group of four” to an interim committee of Africa-IALE, a webpage, a listserv and proposed regional conference in Ghana, West Africa.

**Interim Committee:** The current composition of the interim committee of Africa-IALE is as follows: Dr. Anja Blume – Institute of Political Science II, University of Oldenburg, Germany; Ms. Jane Bemigisha – Makerere University, Uganda / ITC, Netherlands; Mr. Rob Plowes – University of Texas, Austin, USA; Mr. Crispen T. 

The contributions of Hussein Alidina (WWF-Canada) are also greatly appreciated. Within the next couple of months we shall elect from within the committee, interim president and vice-president, treasurer and secretary.

**Membership:** There are currently 42 members of Africa-IALE as of December 1, 2003. An Africa-IALE website and listserv has been established at <http://calmit.unl.edu/africa-iale/> to enhance our membership drive and provide a forum for discussions on pertinent issues. There have been increased enquiries about Africa-IALE as well as membership applications since this website was developed. We have also announced the Africa-IALE website in various communication channels, e.g. SDI-Africa, SD-Dimensions and “Forest Information Update”.

**Publication of Darwin Symposium Proceedings:** Following the Darwin conference, a suggestion was made to explore a special issue on “Landscapes of Africa” in the Journal “Landscape Ecology”. Corresponding negotiations are underway.

**Africa-IALE 2005 Conference – Ghana:** The maiden conference of Africa-IALE is tentatively scheduled to take place in Ghana in mid-2005. The Institute of Renewable Natural Resources (KNUST, Kumasi) has agreed to host the Africa-IALE conference. A Ghana host planning committee has been constituted with the help of

**IALE-UK meeting, Landscape Ecology of Trees and Forests**, Cirencester, Gloucestershire

Habitat fragmentation and the potential impact of human-induced climate change are encouraging a move away from site-based protection to recognition of the importance of landscape-scale processes. Trees and forests play an important role in the wider countryside, providing a 'patchwork' of wildlife rich habitats as the focus for the development of an ecologically functional and sustainable landscape. This conference is aimed at conservation policy and decision makers, planners, land managers and researchers and will explore:

Key concepts in landscape ecology, e.g., landscape thresholds, functional connectivity and physical connectedness

Spatial conservation strategies, e.g., based on: forest habitat networks, focal species and generic species, functional attributes and surrogate measures, buffering to increase core area, linking to create 'wildlife corridors', and 'greenways'.

**Landscape Ecology in the Mediterranean Inside and outside approaches**, Faro, Portugal

The 2005 European Congress of the International Association of Landscape Ecology, to be held in Southern Portugal, will focus on Mediterranean landscapes. Mediterranean landscapes are changing rapidly under driving forces leading to different pathways of change. This situation calls for an adequate framework of approaches, methodologies and management practices. As an awareness of the specific patterns and processes taking place increases, landscape ecological research in the Mediterranean region has responded in recent years by various research projects. However, many challenging issues are still to be discussed, both in research and in management, in order to focus the research agenda. The organization of a Mediterranean oriented IALE Congress is a unique opportunity to bring new insights into the landscape ecology of this region, to debate and reflect on the specific challenges of these landscapes, and to identify future needs for research. It is intended that this Congress will attract researchers and policy makers in Mediterranean landscapes, but also all those who are interested in sharing other perspectives that may contribute to a definition of specific Mediterranean problems and their common features.
